

A Corporate Leadership Steps to the Stars

Adelaide City Council

The Coionel Light Centre is a 10 storey building that houses the majority of Adelakle City Council's administrative staff. Built in the 1970s, the Centre is in the early stages of a refurbishment and retrofit. Recently renovated, the Council's Customer Centre, won the RAIA 2000 Award of Merrt. Join Adelakle City Council and learn of its achievements in corporate efficiency. B Maximising Efficiencies Solutions in Renewable Energy

Burnside Council

The Burnside Millennium Project will see the redeveloped library, community centre and administration building linked, designed and fitted out in a way that maximises energy efficiency whilst saving the Council money. Incorporated initiatives include Photovoltaic technology, Natural ventilation, Double glazing, Solar power, and Thermal efficiency. You will see that energy efficiency initiatives already incorporated into this project promote Burnside as a leader and a smart council.

City of Charles Sturt

Under the auspices of the CCP^M program, Charles Sturt
Council has entered into partnership with Gerard Industries
and Pierlite Pty Ltd to undertake the Digital Precinct Energy
Partnership Project The project tackles energy conservation
and greenhouse gas abatement at a local level through the
AGO's Chailenge Allies program. Through Allies, larger
Greenhouse Challenge companies extend their greenhouse
reduction commitments to smaller businesses through a
mentoring process. This tour takes in other projects including
the Switched on to Solar Lighting Project and the Exporter's
Club Lighting Retrofit project.

D Improving Performance Cogeneration for the neXt-generation

Port Adelaide-Enfield Council

The Osbourne Cogeneration Plant incorporates state of the art technology for improved environmental performance and adopts the energy efficiency Cogeneration process. Cogeneration is an efficient form of power generation and energy delivery that involves the production of useable energy in more than one form (i.e. electricity and heat). In this process thermal energy, which is normally wasted in the process of electricity generation in a conventional power station, is used productively in cogeneration. The results are impressive-reduction in energy costs, improved reliability in energy supply, decrease in overall greenhouse gas emissions. E Identifying Opportunities Wasted Gas – Wasted Opportunity

City of Tea Tree Gully

In some regions, current and old landfill sites have unrealised and often untapped resources. One such region has taken the step to realise some gains not only for itself but also for the entire community The City of Tea Tree Gully has promoted the collection and use of landfill gas through a partnership project with a private company that collects and uses landfill gas to produce electricity Two adjacent old landfill sites are being used to collect landfill gas, converting it to electricity and placing this electricity on the grid Delegates will have the opportunity to talk to the Manager of the larger of the two sites and experience first hand the transformation of waste into useable clean energy
