3. CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES

Project to Encourage Public Transport Usage-Bus Shelter.

Mr Wake provided an update on his investigations regarding funding for encouraging public transport by enhancing bus shelters within the City.

The committee discussed the extent to which bus shelters encourage usage of public transport and design features (to reduce and heat stress for patrons). The Precinct Planning process could also assist in developing bus shelter placements. Mrs Wood noted that Transport presently has issued a brochure and survey on transport issues.

Cr Hollywood provided an update regarding the waste management working group and referred to recent developments with Stirling waste management. Discussion followed including the waste processing conducted by Atlas. Mr Kurup noted the need for a household recycling programme and Mr Wake referred to waste minimisation programmes such as the Earthcare programme from the Department of Environmental Protection. Mr Wake referred to a waste management and resource use workshop in early 2002. There was discussion on the establishment of a working group to address waste management issues. Mr Kirton questioned the need for a working group as Infrastructure Management is preparing a paper a report to Council on waste management issues. Additionally the Mindarie Regional Council has commissioned a major study on secondary waste issues.

6.2 State Sustainability Strategy Initiative Announced by WA Premier Geoff Gallop. (Mr Goldsmith)

The Premier Dr Geoff Gallop has announced a State Government initiative to develop a sustainability strategy for Western Australia, to positively shape the long term future of the State. The strategy sets out to pursue new forms of development that do not compromise the health of our environment or society. The Sustainability Strategy will be developed in consultation with the community, and will be released for public comment mid-next year.

The announcement highlights some of the key sustainability opportunities including integrated transport, improved urban design of neighbourhoods, improved energy efficiency and waste reduction.

Major sustainability challenges faced by our community include the substantial reduction in rainfall over the past twenty years, and the impact of Global Warming which is expected to further reduce rainfall, the very high reliance on car usage and the impact of salinity on agricultural lands and biodiversity.

The City of Joondalup has a significant role to play in contributing to the State's Sustainability strategy, given that the City of Joondalup represents 157,000 residents (approximately 13% of the Perth's metropolitan area population). Introduction of a City of Joondalup Local By-Law Regulating the Installation of Domestic Wood Combustion Heaters.

Background

As identified in the Perth Air Quality Management Plan (Government of Western Australia, 2000), domestic wood combustion (wood-fired heaters) is the greatest contributor to haze and particulate matter in the Perth metropolitan airshed. This air pollution is as a result of the high reliance on wood heaters during the colder months. The burning of wood fuels for domestic heating is also a significant source of greenhouse gas emissions and contributes to the process of global warming

The need for Local Governments to actively reduce air pollution sources within their municipalities is paramount. The economic, social and environmental costs of regional air pollution are directly borne by the community, and in part, by the Local Council in the provision of services (such as increased provision of health care services) that are required to combat the problem.

The problem of pollution from domestic combustion wood heaters is an issue that the City of Joondalup can actively mitigate. This document provides background information and a recommendation on how the City of Joondalup can actively mitigate the environmental, social and economic costs of air pollution through improving local air quality.

Part 1 of the Perth Air Quality Management Plan is attached for further reference.

Social, Environmental and Economic costs of Air Pollution

Research has identified a range of social and health issues associated with air pollution. The health effects are result from the inhalation of gasses and particulate matter produced from the burning of fossil fuels. Some of the health effects include:

- Respiratory disease and illness such as asthma, bronchitis and pneumonia.
- Decreased lung function
- Damage to the nerves, brain and kidneys.

The environmental impacts of air pollution have also been well documented. The impacts of air pollution affect ecological function in a range of environments including estuarine (wetland), marine and terrestrial. The economic costs of air pollution are also high, mainly through

reduced employee absenteeism (due to better health) and the increased provision of health care services to combat the associated health problems.

Domestic Heating Alternatives

Domestic wood combustion heaters represent inefficient and outdated technology. A range of modern and efficient alternatives exists.

The major alternatives to domestic wood combustion heaters are **natural gas heaters** and **electric heaters**. The benefits of these two heating options include:

- Equal or higher heating efficiency with limited heat loss (wood combustion heating has a high heat loss through the chimney), and
- Significantly reduced emissions that contribute to air pollution and greenhouse gas emissions.

Recommendation

The following recommendation aims to implement a general phase-out of domestic wood combustion heaters for the City of Joondalup region. This recommendation focuses on the installation of new domestic heaters in order to change community behaviour over the next 30 years (or expected lifetime of the existing domestic wood combustion heaters currently installed).

Households that currently operate wood combustion heaters will be able to continue to do so. However, households wishing to replace existing domestic wood combustion heaters will only be able to replace the heaters with natural gas or electric alternatives. New houses will only be able to install natural gas heaters or electric heaters.

It is envisaged that other municipalities within the Perth Metropolitan Region will also adopt these beneficial changes.

The Environmental and Sustainability Advisory Committee advises that Council adopt the following motion to be introduced as a Local By-law, that:

"From March 2002, it will be illegal to install or replace domestic wood combustion heaters in residential, commercial or industrial dwellings within the City of Joondalup."
