EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Conservation Advisory Committee (CAC) has requested that Council officers investigate the possibility of bushland Friends groups in the City being able to garner the assistance of volunteers registered with Volunteering WA with projects in the natural areas managed by the City. The CAC has requested staff to provide a report on this topic for the CAC meeting to be held on 29 March 2006. Committee members will then further discuss the issue at this meeting.

BACKGROUND

Volunteering WA is the peak body for volunteering in Western Australia. It is a membership based organisation and its main focus is to link volunteers with community based not for profit agencies.

Volunteering WA retains a database of volunteers from throughout the state, which matches these volunteers with community organisations requiring volunteers.

The ten bushland Friends groups operating within the City's natural areas are examining ways to increase their membership base and the use of volunteers from Volunteering WA is one of the options they are to examine.

DETAILS

Issues and options considered:

Ten Friends groups and a coast care group currently assist the City in the management of natural areas. Volunteers undertake many tasks, including vegetation and weed surveys, conducting guided nature walks, and planting indigenous plant species.

The City's Friends groups feel an association with Volunteering WA will be a means to boost group membership and enable them to utilise volunteers on Volunteering WAs database. Local volunteers could be located, thereby building a long-term association with locally based volunteers.

ITEM 1 FERAL BEES IN CITY'S RESERVES

PURPOSE

To introduce for discussion the impact feral bees have on the City's reserves and the possible eradication of bees within these reserves.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Conservation Advisory Committee (CAC) has requested that Council officers investigate the impact feral bees are having on the City's reserves in particular the bushland reserves, with a view to the possible eradication of feral bees from these reserves.

The CAC requested staff to provide a report on this topic for committee members to discuss at CAC meeting on 3 May 2006.

BACKGROUND

The existence of European feral bees on land managed by the City has been the topic for discussion at the Conservation Advisory Committee on many occasions in the Committees ten-year history. Up to this point discussions have been general in nature and no reports have been requested and no motions passed.

The main concern of members has been the threat these bees pose to public safety and their detrimental affect on the biodiversity of natural areas.

At the March 2006 Conservation Advisory Committee Meeting the Committee resolved the following;

That the Conservation Advisory Committee requests Council to endorse the Committees request for a report on the immediate eradication of feral bees on all land managed by the City of Joondalup for public safety and to maintain biodiversity.

DETAILS

Issues and options considered:

European bees were introduced to Western Australia in the early nineteenth century as a source of honey and for crop pollination. Bees have since escaped captivity and are found throughout parklands and bushland within the Perth metropolitan region.

The City has been very proactive in disposing of swarming bees when they have been found on verges and in parklands because of the risk bee stings pose to residents. The removal of bees under these circumstances is an activity the City has undertaken for over twenty years and has been viewed as a public safety issue.

Recent research has revealed that bees also pose a serious ecological threat to Western Australia's biodiversity as found in our natural spaces. Feral bees (introduced species) nest in the same locations as our native birds and mammals, ie holes in tree trunks and hollow logs. This has had a substantial deleterious affect on the numbers of native birds and mammals found in our bushland reserves.

Birds and mammals will not enter areas where bees are active and this limits their choice of nesting hollows and results in reduced fauna populations. A recent survey undertaken near the Cateby Roadhouse on the Brand Highway found that in 1996, 74 potential nesting hollows were recorded along a 3km creek bed, of which two were occupied by bees. When the area was checked again in 2005 every hollow contained a bee's nest, which demonstrates the affect feral bees have on hollow dependent fauna.

To maintain biodiversity and to reduce the risk to the public, the CAC members wish to bring to Council's attention the impacts feral bees are having on the City's natural areas.
