Members of the community were asked to identify a suitable project for expenditure of the Kingsley Community Funds during a public consultation period which concluded on 5 December 2006. Opportunities for the community to provide their ideas were advertised in the Community Newspapers and on the City's website.

A summary of the proposals (using wording within the proposals where possible) the issues they are intended to address and any identified anticipated benefits of the proposals to the Kingsley Community is provided in the table below.
