

OVERVIEW

The community was invited to provide feedback on a proposal to install two additional cricket practice nets alongside the existing nets in Barridale Park, Kingsley. The community consultation was undertaken from 1 June 2021 to 21 June 2021 and feedback was sought by way of an Online Comment Form to determine the overall level of community support for the proposal.

The City collected 53 valid responses throughout the 21-day advertised consultation period. A total of 22 responses were received from local residents and ratepayers within a 200 metres radius of Barridale Park, and 17 responses were received from Community Engagement Network members residing in Kingsley. The City also received responses from representatives of Kingsley Junior Football Club and Kingsley Woodvale Junior Cricket Club. This indicates an overall response rate of 6.1% (for stakeholders who had been engaged directly by the City).

Respondents were asked to indicate their level of support for the installation of two additional cricket practice nets on a 5-point scale from "strongly oppose" to "strongly support". Approximately 90% of respondents indicated that they "support" or "strongly support" the proposal.

Additional comments from respondents offered general support for the proposal and described the view that upgraded/new cricket nets are much needed/overdue, the view that the works will be positive for local children/sporting teams/residents, requests for alternative/additional infrastructure at the park, and concern about the removal of trees.

STAKEHOLDERS

A total of 677 stakeholders were directly engaged by the City. Stakeholders identified included:

- Local residents and ratepayers within a 200 metres radius of Barridale Park = 507
- Community Engagement Network members residing in Kingsley = 167
- Barridale Park user groups = 3
 - Kingsley Junior Football Club
 - · Kingsley Woodvale Junior Cricket Club
 - Kingsley Woodvale Senior Cricket Club

Additional stakeholders, including park visitors and interested residents and ratepayers living further than 200 metres from the park, were also indirectly engaged by the City via the consultation materials described overleaf.


CONSULTATION MATERIALS

Local residents and ratepayers within a 200 metres radius of Barridale Park were sent information packs through the post on 1 June 2021 containing a cover letter and Frequently Asked Questions document. These stakeholders were directed via the cover letter to the City's website to complete the Online Comment Form.

Community Engagement Network members residing in Kingsley were sent emails on 1 June 2021 advising them of the consultation and linking them to the City's website to view the Frequently Asked Questions document and complete the Online Comment Form.

Barridale Park user groups were sent emails on 1 June 2021 advising them of the consultation and seeking a formal written response representing the views of their group. The City requested their feedback be submitted either via email or letter.



RESPONSE RATE

The City collected a total of 53 valid responses throughout the 21–day advertised consultation period. Responses that were considered valid include all those which contained contact details enabling identification and were submitted within the advertised timeframe.

Of the 507 residents and ratepayers within a 200 metres radius of Barridale Park, 22 submitted feedback. A total of 17 Community Engagement Network members submitted feedback, as well as 16 community members who were not directly engaged.

In relation to the Barridale Park user groups, the City received a response from representatives of the Kingsley Junior Football Club and Kingsley Woodvale Junior Cricket Club. (Note that an analysis of these stakeholder responses has not been included in this report. Full verbatim responses are provided at Appendix 15–16.)

The overall response rate is 6.1% from stakeholders who were engaged directly by the City. This data is shown in the table below.







Barridale Park, Kingsley – Installation of Additional Cricket Practice Nets Frequently Asked Questions

What is the purpose of the community consultation?

To seek feedback from local residents, interested community members and user groups on a proposal to install two additional cricket practice nets alongside the existing two cricket practice nets in Barridale Park, Kingsley.

Where is Barridale Park located?

Barridale Park is located between Barridale Drive, Beech Road, Fontley Road and Dalmain Street in Kingsley. An aerial map showing the location can be found overleaf.

What works are being proposed?

The City is proposing to install two additional cricket practice nets along the eastern side of the existing two cricket practice nets. The City is also proposing to refurbish the existing nets.

Why is the City proposing to install new cricket practice nets at Barridale Park?

The City has received an expression of interest to install additional cricket practice nets from a local sporting club that currently utilises the park to address the increase in female participation in cricket and allow two teams to train at the same time in the nets. The City would like to know if the community is supportive of the proposal.

How would the proposed works be funded?

It is anticipated that the project would be funded in partnership with the State Government and the sporting club who requested the infrastructure, on an equal one-third basis, via the State Government's Community Sporting and Recreation Facilities Fund.

When would the works take place?

Construction works would take place between January 2022 and June 2022.

Would any trees or vegetation be removed as part of the works?

The location of the proposed cricket nets has been selected to ensure minimal impact to the existing vegetation at the site. As part of the project, two existing trees would need to be removed, these have been highlighted on the aerial map overleaf. The City would plant up to six suitable replacement trees within the park.

Who is being consulted on this proposal?

The City is directly consulting the following community stakeholders:

- Residents and ratepayers within a 200 metre radius of Barridale Park
- Community Engagement Network members residing in Kingsley
- Kingsley and Greenwood Residents Association
- Park user groups.

In addition, signage has been installed at Barridale Park and all information is available on the City's website. Anyone interested in the proposal can submit feedback via an Online Comment Form. Responses are limited to one per person, or one formal response per club/organisation.



Aerial map of Barridale Park:





After a decade-long search, the Joondalup Men's Shed (JMS) has a permanent home. Last month the JMS moved into new premises at 17 Winton Road, Joondalup – the former site of the City of Joondalup's

building maintenance depot. Men's sheds provide safe, friendly and inclusive environments where men can meet and work on meaningful projects such as manual crafts. Significant refurbishment and power upgrades were required for the Winton Road site to meet the current and future needs of the group.

Extension works were also required at the City's main Works Operations Centre in Craigie to accommodate the relocation of staff. The City invested \$1.23 million over four years

to the project, and the JMS also contributed \$168,000. The JMS was established in 2010 and had

been located at the former Padbury Senior High School site under a lease arrangement with the Department of Education. That agreement expired in 2019.

In December 2018 Joondalup Council determined the City's building maintenance depot would be the best location to house the JMS.

Concept plan for consultation

The future activation of century-old Duffy House in Woodvale has taken a step forward after Joondalup Council endorsed the release of a concept plan for public comment.

One of the City's oldest buildings, the single storey limestone cottage - constructed between 1911 and 1913 - is associated with the prominent Duffy family who were early settlers of the area and long-time Wanneroo residents. It has been abandoned since 2009.

The key feature of the concept plan is a proposal for a modest development that would support a commercial operation such as a café or restaurant. Based on initial stakeholder feedback, the venue could potentially host seasonal market/events, weddings and alfresco dining.

The concept plan will go out for feedback from Thursday 22 July – Wednesday 18 August 2021. This will include direct consultation with residents and landowners within 500m of the site, community groups, the Duffy family and members of the City's Reconciliation Action Plan Reference Group and the Wanneroo Historical Society.

City seeks EOIs for car race

Two decades after the inaugural Joondalup City Speed Classic, a classic car race could again return to the Joondalup City Centre.

The City is currently seeking an Expression of Interest (EOI) from a relevant service provider to own, develop, manage, plan and deliver the event. The City would be the key stakeholder and sponsor. The Joondalup City Speed Classic was held shortly after the establishment of the City of Joondalup in the late-1990s, which promoted the City as the 'Heart of the North' after its split from the City of the City of Wanneroo.

Hosting significant events are part of the City's strategy to position Joondalup as a destination that offer a diverse mix of iconic events with local, national and international appeal.





Liquor licensing

Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries Service of alcohol outside of the hours of a club restricted licence require an occasional liquor licence to be granted from the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC). Prior to applying to DLGSC, permission must first be obtained from the City.

If the club is hosting fixtures or special events not covered by their club restricted licence, please contact the Sport and Recreation team for occasional liquor license requests.

Food trucks within the City



Many clubs seek the services of coffee vans and food trucks to provide refreshments to spectators at weekend fixtures. The City's *Local Government and Public Property Local Law 2014* requires vendors selling goods and services in a public place, to hold a trader's permit.

The process of getting a trader's permit approved can take up to four weeks so it is best to plan ahead when wanting to engage a coffee van or food truck.

Verbatim responses — Do you have any comments about the proposal? (N = 41)

I think it will be good for the park and good for sporting teams to be able to use them. The nets there are ready for an upgrade.

This would be great for the kids (and adults) in the area. The existing nets are extremely old and are in desperate need of refurbishing. Would be great if they were either moved, or some of the trees around were removed, due to the amount of debris that lands in the nets. The honky nuts are especially dangerous for the boys when batting and running.

I think they are a good idea as long as the large trees don't need to be removed. Also, can the playground surface be repaired.

The uptake of cricket in the Kingsley area has been fantastic. Pressure on net space has increased with the welcome addition of girls' and women's cricket, and the growing demand for cricket options for children with additional needs.

I am in support of the club wanting to increase the number of cricket nets. However, I am slightly concerned that adding two will result in the loss of larger trees surrounding them. If you to put two more nets, I think this will definitely have a large impact on the surrounding trees, which I am not in favour of. However, adding 1 additional net to the east side could be accommodated with minimal impact to surrounding trees. We need to retain as many trees as possible for a number of reasons, but it also provides a more attractive surrounding area for local residents. It's a balancing act...that's why I only support it. I would strongly support it if it had 1 net and kept more trees in place.

This park is used for cricket matches and is big enough to cater for more nets.

I feel anything that support youth sport is advantageous to our area.

Can the City stop catering for male-focused sports and install netball courts which girls can access outside of school opening hours? There are more than enough cricket and football facilities in Kingsley.

Love walking around this oval on the weekends and watching a bit of cricket — so yes please. Please try to minimise any damage to existing vegetation.

They get used every day after school by kids waiting to get picked up or on their walk home. Great community feel/use of oval. A community asset, not just for the club members.

Live very close by and will utilise the proposed nets regularly.

I don't understand why you are wasting any time and effort asking the question. Why wouldn't it be acceptable? This is 2021 not 1921.

Our community lost [- -] just a few weeks back in a [- - -]. She lived on [- - -] and was a wellrecognised person in the community — involved in so many community groups. I was wondering if one of the new trees could have a plaque — a place for us to visit and reflect on [- - -], we already miss [- - -] so much.

There are currently insufficient training nets available during weeknights for teams or casual usage of nets due to clubs having priority to the facilities. If this goes ahead, consideration to protecting cars in the adjacent car park needs to be high priority and the overhanging trees over the nets need to be removed for safety reasons of the users due to lighting issues in late afternoon.

More facilities support increased sporting opportunities for all.

Need to install better lighting around the football oval as well.

Definitely needs upgrading! The nets at Penistone Park are something to look at, they are perfect! Hope to see them at Barridale soon A

I think it is a great thing to provide more and upgraded practice nets. I have no concerns whatsoever.

I live [- - -] *the park and walk my dog there every* [- - -]. *The nets are used almost exclusively by children and do not interfere with other activities in the park. Great to see these keen, aspiring cricketers exercising and striving for improvement.*

I do think the money would be best used for the people that use the park every day, rather than spending a huge amount of money on something that would be lucky to be used 1 to 2 hours each week. The nets that are already there get used 1 to 2 times a week only during summer and are unused the rest of the year. There are plenty of nets at Kingsley Oval and the nets at Moolanda are basically new. Seems like a waste of money considering how little any of the cricket nets around Kingsley are used. I think we have 4 at Kingsley Oval, 3 new at Moolanda, and 2 at Barridale. Please don't waste money adding 2 more. Barridale Park could definitely do with more gazebo areas or more play equipment for the children. Another idea would be to do an enrichment area for the dogs that is not fenced. Unfortunately, all the dog enrichment areas are fenced, and a lot of people are not willing to put their dogs in a fenced area with out of control dogs. Barridale is a well know social spot for the dogs and owners in the morning and afternoons and I'm sure it would get a lot more use than extra cricket nets.

As it currently stands, there is only 1 set of cricket nets in the suburbs of Greenwood, Kingsley and Woodvale combined, that has 4 nets that are publicly available. With the rise of women's cricket in the community, it would be great if they could have their own space to train together and feel comfortable. An average cricket team will use 2 nets per team, so having 4 nets will allow multiple teams to train comfortably at the same time. The only other location with 4 nets currently available is at Kingsley Oval of which the 4 nets are only available 2 nights a week, as the senior cricket club uses all 4 on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and the junior club uses them as part of their current girls' training and under 9 years' programs on a Friday night.

I think any exercise for people is beneficial and especially for the youth. Countless times, driving past Barridale Park, I have seen people practice, so I feel they would be of value as more people could practice, young and not so young.

Great idea!

These clubs are not getting any smaller and, in fact, continue to grow. I know that the nets at Hawker and Penistone greatly helped my club and alleviated pressure on other grounds for training. We cannot get any new grounds in our built-up suburb, but adding nets will help already used grounds. Having great facilities also encourages kids to join the club as they get a better training experience, rather than all being jostled into two nets.

Very overdue!

I have often seen the 2 current nets utilised together. More would probably be needed.

I support this on the condition that any trees removed will be replaced.

I think it is a great idea. Keep more children in sports.

It was raised at a committee meeting that we should move it to the other side because of the amount of foliage that is dropped by surrounding trees. So, we are supportive of their location and thank the COJ.

Love this idea, the existing nets also need an upgrade.

Have lived in the area for a [- - -] and ever since Barridale Park was developed it's been a pleasure to see it so well used by many different sporting codes, dog clubs and family gatherings. It's a credit to our area and any sporting development should be encouraged.

Please also extend the size of the toilets and update them. They aren't a suitable size for any age teams to get changed in. They are filthy and old. Young kids, even at the food truck fiestas, can't be expected to go in there. One men's toilet for the large numbers that attend this oval during sport or food trucks, is not enough. Constantly seeing kids having to wee behind trees instead.

I am in favour of this proposal.

Great idea. Barridale Park is being well utilised by the junior sporting clubs. To acknowledge the increasing participation of females in sport and the requirements of appropriate facilities is very progressive.

Fantastic idea, well needed with the amount of growing cricket clubs in the area.

I think it is a great idea. Love driving past the park seeing it being used by all sports clubs and neighbourhood families. A real sense of community.

Great proposal, boost for cricket in the suburbs.

We oppose the proposal for installation of additional practice nets at Barridale Park due to the impact on the natural environment of the existing eucalyptus gum trees. Over many years there has been a continuous and marked degrading and removal of the tree cover around the oval precinct to the point where it has become difficult in summer to find adequate tree cover whilst watching the sporting activities or exercising around the oval precinct. One can notice this, in particular, by the placement of bench seats by the City of Joondalup. These were placed under tree cover in a number of locations but, due to dieback and other disease with the trees having been removed, they are now in full sun. Over the last 2–3 years, we have counted around 12 eucalyptus and banksia trees being removed with stump grinding undertaken by Council Contractors. We urge the Joondalup City to reject this application, but to take this opportunity in hand to undertake a major replanting of native trees beyond the proposed number of six, to at least twelve, to replace some of the many trees that have been lost over the years. This action will be in line with Urban Greening Strategy. [---] and [---] — local residents for [---] years. As a parent of past junior cricketers, I would love to see the extra practice nets installed at Barridale Park. Our sons continued to use the nets even when they weren't playing junior cricket, as they were easily accessible and continued their interest in cricket. Surely keeping the local youth occupied by giving them access to these resources is in the community's best interest. Even though two trees need to be removed, they are guite small trees and, as stated, the Council will plant up to six replacements in the park, which we think is one of the nicest. shadiest parks in the City of Joondalup. The fact that two teams can train at the same time would be highly beneficial. Overall, I think it will be an excellent project and one which will appreciate by local sporting clubs, parents, and players.
