



COMMUNITY CONSULTATION OUTCOMES REPORT

Use of Bramston Park, Burns Beach

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OVERVIEW

The community were invited to provide feedback from 24 November 2022 to 14 December 2022 on two matters related to the use of Bramston Park, Burns Beach as follows:

1. The continuation of female senior sport at Bramston Park, Burns Beach, following a recent trial period.
2. The establishment of a shared use agreement for Bramston Park with Burns Beach Primary School.

A total of 139 responses were received during the 21-day consultation period.

In regard to the continuation of female senior sport, approximately one-third of respondents were aware that female senior sport was being trialled at Bramston Park. When asked to indicate their level of support for the continued use of Bramston Park for female senior sport over three-quarters were supportive. When asked for any comments about the trial, some issues raised by respondents included:

- Parking problems are an issue when sport is being played
- The park should be available for all / gender should not be part of the consideration.

In regard to the shared use agreement with Burns Beach Primary School, over two-thirds strongly supported the use and the combined level of support was above 80%. When asked for any comments about the shared use agreement some issues raised by respondents included:

- Dog walkers need access to the park during school days
- School should be responsible for maintenance costs (no additional cost to ratepayers)
- Community needs access to the park in the day (should not be exclusive use).



CONSULTATION MATERIALS

Residents and landowners of properties within a 200 metres radius of Bramston Park, Burns Beach, were sent information packs through the post on 24 November 2022. Information packs contained a cover letter and a Frequently Asked Questions document which directed those stakeholders to complete an Online Comment Form located on the City's website.

Resident / ratepayer groups and sporting clubs were sent emails on 24 November 2022 which advised them of the consultation and directed them to provide written feedback via post or email. These stakeholders were also encouraged to promote the consultation and the Online Comment Form to their members and networks.

RESPONSE RATE

The City collected a total of 139 valid responses throughout the 21-day advertised consultation period. Responses that were considered valid include all those which contained contact details enabling identification and were submitted within the advertised timeframe. Of the 278 residents within a 200 metres radius of Bramston Park, Burns Beach, 35 submitted feedback. None of the sporting clubs contacted submitted feedback, whilst 2 of the 15 resident / ratepayer groups provided feedback. This indicates an overall response rate of 12.5%. This data is shown in the table below.

Note that an analysis of the responses from the resident / ratepayer groups has not been included in this report. Full verbatim responses are provided at Appendix 14–15.





Were you aware that female senior sport was being trialled at Bramston Park, Burns Beach?




QUESTION: “To what extent do you support the continued use of Bramston Park by female senior sport teams, for training and fixtured games?”



Use of Bramston Park, Burns Beach Frequently Asked Questions

What is the purpose of the community consultation?

The City of Joondalup is seeking community feedback on two matters relating to the use of Bramston Park, Burns Beach:

1. A trial of expanded use of the park which has allowed for female senior sport since **April 2022**. (The use of the park was previously restricted to junior sport only.)
2. A proposal from Burns Beach Primary School to establish a shared use agreement that would allow them to use Bramston Park on school days between 8.00am – 4.00pm.

Where is Bramston Park located?

Bramston Park is located between Burns Beach Road, Watcombe Avenue, Bramston Vista and Mattingleys Approach in Burns Beach. A map showing the location can be found overleaf.

Which sporting groups currently use Bramston Park on a regular basis?

Since its establishment, the hiring of Bramston Park has been restricted to junior sporting teams only.

Prior to a trial commencing in April 2022, Bramston Park was used by Joondalup Kinross Junior Cricket Club in summer, and Kingsley Westside Football Club in winter.

At its meeting on 15 February 2022, Council approved a 12-month trial of female senior teams from Kingsley Westside Football Club ([CJ024-02/22](#) refers).

Why was the use of Bramston Park restricted to junior sporting teams only?

Prior to the development of the Bramston Park Community Sporting Facility, community consultation was conducted in 2013 to determine the level of support for the facility and the adjacent playing fields. Outcomes from this early consultation showed the majority of respondents supported the development.

However, some concerns were raised about parking, noise, traffic and anti-social behaviour. In response to these concerns, Council agreed to restrict the use of the playing fields to junior sport only.

Why did Council decide to trial senior female sport at Bramston Park?

The City has received requests from local community sporting clubs to use Bramston Park playing fields for senior sport since its opening in 2015. There is currently high demand for sporting facilities across the City, particularly for playing fields suitable for winter season sports.

As a result of a specific request from Kingsley Westside Football Club, Council approved a 12-month trial of senior female sporting use of Bramston Park and requested that community consultation be undertaken following the trial to determine future use of the park ([CJ024-02/22](#) refers).

Will the City consider the use of Bramston Park by senior male sporting teams?

At this stage, the City is not considering expanding the use of Bramston Park to senior male sporting teams.

Why is Burns Beach Primary School seeking a shared use agreement for Bramston Park?

Burns Beach Primary School does not have a park or space for sporting activities on-site. As Bramston Park is located adjacent to the school, it is proposed that a shared use agreement be established. Similar agreements are already in place with other primary schools in the City, including North Woodvale Primary School, Mullaloo Heights Primary School, Eddystone Primary School, and Currabine Primary School.

What does the proposed shared use agreement include?

The proposed shared use agreement would allow Burns Beach Primary School access to Bramston Park on school days from 8.00am – 4.00pm. They would be permitted to use the park for specific purposes only, which would include playing, and performance or conduct of sport/recreational activities.

Under the proposed shared use agreement, Burns Beach Primary School would have priority use of Bramston Park during these times, similar to when other community sport users book the venue.

Does Burns Beach Primary School currently use Bramston Park?

Since opening at the start of 2022, Burns Beach Primary School have used Bramston Park a number of times on a casual basis, booking the space through the City’s usual venue hire processes.

Who is being consulted on these matters?

The City is directly consulting with the following community stakeholders:

- Residents and ratepayers within 200 metres of Bramston Park
- Local resident/ratepayer groups
- Park user groups
- Burns Beach Primary School.

In addition, signage has been installed onsite at the park and all information is available on the City’s website. Anyone interested in the proposal can submit feedback via an Online Comment Form. Responses are limited to one per person.

How do I provide feedback on the proposal?

If you are interested in providing feedback, please complete the Online Comment Form available via the Community Consultation section of the City’s website at joondalup.wa.gov/community-consultation Hard-copy Comment Forms are also available upon request.

When is the community consultation period open?

The community consultation period is open from **Thursday 24 November 2022 – Wednesday 14 December 2022.**



City claims another award for water management

The City of Joondalup has claimed its third environmental award in the past 12 months for its sustainable water management practices.

The City won the LG Professionals WA's Environmental Leadership and Sustainability Award for its Smart Control Irrigation System technology, which was installed at more than 200 parks across the City.

Linked to a web-based central control system, the technology enables the City to monitor, adjust and maintain its irrigation system in real time. This can be done from a smartphone, laptop or any web-enabled device.

The system captures data and information to adjust various irrigation programs for different parks and public open spaces, resulting in an 86,000kl reduction in groundwater use between 2019/20 and 2020/21 - 14% below the City's licensed groundwater allocation.

This latest accolade - the City of Joondalup was earlier this year named WA's Platinum Waterwise Council of the Year, the highest accolade a WA Local Government can attain for water conservation - gives the City confidence it is striking the right balance between the provision of water services for the community with the protection of water resources in the context of a drying climate.







Do you have any comments about the trial? (N = 58)
<i>Would like part of this park being made a dog park. There are many facilities for children in the area and sports but none for off-lead dogs. Joondalup is too far. Each suburb or every 3 suburbs (eg Iluka, Burns, Kinross) should have a dog park.</i>
<i>There is a major issue with parking around Bramston Vista, Mattingleys Approach and Burns Beach Road when sporting events are on. People park on the verge in front of people’s houses, on Council grassed areas and with no respect to areas not designed to have cars on them. There has also been an increase of rubbish on the grounds (water bottles, orange peels etc).</i>
<i>The park should be used as much as possible, providing all areas are respected and maintained.</i>
<i>Female sport needs our support in all facets, always.</i>
<i>I support the use for senior sport if it is outside school hours.</i>
<i>This will deprive kids of an area to train and connect with friends of the club. I strongly oppose this proposal. There are plenty of other parks for the females to train at, especially when they can drive to alternate facilities, lots of kids (including mine) often cycle to this park safely. Do not make them have to travel to an alternative location please.</i>
<i>There are very few facilities for walking dogs off-lead in Burns Beach. Lots of facilities all over the place for children and sports. Why is it always sports / children’s activities / playgrounds that are offered. There are many dogs in the suburb. No off-lead dog parks. Only beach area is at Hillarys which is vastly overcrowded. Joondalup dog park very busy and not close by. Each suburb should have a facility to exercise dogs off-lead. They are as much our family as the kids/grandkids</i>
<i>This was passed many years ago for juniors only, so try and do what you promised.</i>
<i>As residents, we were assured the use of Bramston Park was for junior sport only. I strongly oppose the use of this facility for senior sport.</i>
<i>Great to see the facilities being utilised as intended.</i>
<i>I feel the grounds can’t take the hammering of so much sport being played on the grounds. The lawn gets in terrible condition during winter soccer.</i>
<i>Damage to grass and use of alcohol during and after games. Lack of parking.</i>
<i>I have no issue. The facility needs to be accessible to residents. Most of the time it is empty anyway.</i>
<i>Apart from a standard financial remuneration back to the City, and returned to Burns Beach community maintenance, any use of the park should not fill the early hours of the morning or late hours of the day. For example, don’t start sport until 10.00 am and finish by 3.00 pm to allow residents to do non-group sports (such as kite flying, family soccer, family cricket, street footy) to enjoy the facility. The space is not designed for formal groups exclusively.</i>
<i>I live [- - -] and I love hearing all the sports happening at the park. It has not impacted me (or my small business) in any negative way.</i>
<i>A great addition to the use of the park, influential for young girls watching the ladies train as it may encourage girls to get involved and be outdoors more often.</i>
<i>Terrific use of facilities.</i>
<i>Shocked that the senior sport is pushing the junior sport out of Bramston Park which has been operating in the area for over 10 years. Shame on COJ for money grabbing.</i>
<i>I support this as long as the group respect this area as a public use area (including change rooms etc) and leave everything in a pristine condition after each use.</i>

<i>I have no issues with the park being used by any sporting group or Burns Beach PS. I have issue with all of the sporting people parking all over the kerbs and on corners which make it dangerous. Every weekend there is sport — I have to dodge cars [- - -]! These sporting groups could be utilising the huge car park at Burns Beach Primary School, where every time a sporting event is on the car park sits empty. This applies to people using the clubroom for functions as well. Having this sporting facility and hall in a small suburb has caused major traffic problems.</i>
<i>Unsure why anyone would have a problem with other people playing sport, getting outside and socialising.</i>
<i>No disruption to [- - -] Bramston Park at all.</i>
<i>The trial was for adult women's soccer. Fully support this trial if it's in relation to soccer. I think the City needs to clarify the wording of this, because, to my knowledge, AFL football was never on trial at Bramston. This consultation has come after the fact that the City has already approved West Perth women's AFL to train and utilise the park. This decision came without any prior conference or notice with KWFC. This decision has now put the junior football club's intake and restricted training from February onwards, due to the overlap of the pre-season and the WPFC season. Given the major sponsorship relationship between West Perth and the City there looks like a bias has been made. What is stranger about the decision is that Bramston Park is not an AFL oval. There are dedicated facilities with lighting for AFL which are available and have lighting for West Perth to play at. Why has the City not directed West Perth to an AFL oval? Given West Perth are a senior team, they have the biggest stadium in the area to utilise. Can I ask why the women's team are being pushed out to the suburbs and why they don't use their own facilities to train at HBF? Instead of pushing out an established junior football club like KWFC on a soccer-orientated facility.</i>
<i>Whilst the female soccer (proper football) practice is not every night, it is not in itself too encroaching on the rest of the park, but of late, we have noted that the woman's AFL teams have been using the park also. There is way too much sport on the ground, families and residents are now travelling to other parks to carry out their own recreation.</i>
<i>The more use and support of City-provided amenities the better. We must support those who wish to utilise these.</i>
<i>Didn't know it was running, so it didn't affect my usage of the park. The more CoJ can do to encourage physical activity, the healthier and better our community is. The challenge will be balancing formal use by sporting groups and informal community use.</i>
<i>It didn't affect my use of the park in any way, I see no reason as to why it shouldn't continue.</i>
<i>Please keep the park for junior sport.</i>
<i>I support the use for the Kingsley Westside girls' soccer to train and play, but I do not support the women's AFL Falcon team to train there.</i>
<i>I strongly support all female soccer to train and play at this park.</i>
<i>Dependant on the times. If it is outside school times, I support this.</i>
<i>It shouldn't be for a trial, parks should be allowed for use by anyone in the community.</i>
<i>Believe female and male senior sport should be allowed use of the park</i>
<i>An oval should be utilised to its full potential by any sporting club which requires it. Full utilisation of an oval benefits the community and what we pay our rates towards. I fully support female senior sporting teams using this oval.</i>
<i>Excellent to provide female senior sports which will help with bone and muscle strength after menopause.</i>
<i>Doesn't seem to have had any impact on my life and I live close to the park.</i>
<i>Fabulous idea. Hope it's more than a trial.</i>
<i>Trial was announced without any feedback being sought ahead of this taking place. The park is already over utilised and in poor condition from usage prior to this trial. The ability for the community to access the park has been reduced even further and the conditions of the park have further deteriorated. We already have huge issues and concerns with parking on verges, across driveways, which has been further exacerbated.</i>

<i>Your last question is very poorly worded and clearly intended to elicit a response that is negative. Your survey therefore is already flawed. I highly support female sports off all kinds. This is not the issue. The issue is the management and handling of decision making by COJ. The KWFC has a high level of female participation. The problem is you have made a predetermined decision to not consult with KWFC regarding the use of the facilities. A club that has been there for a significant number of years. You have also made decisions regarding fee structures that failed to adequately consult with the impacted groups. This is a significant failure of the COJ and, to me, implies a degree of financial gain or self-interest by a party or parties involved. This 11th hour feedback process will not change the decision whatsoever. I look forward to you proving me wrong but, in reality, we already know the outcome. Well done on your support of junior sports.</i>
<i>Think it's great, the more use the better.</i>
<i>Parking for Sunday morning games is an issue with cars parking along / off Burns Beach Road; this results in an increase in the probability of an accident. CoJ should organise parking restrictions, whilst developing additional parking at the Primary School. Without restrictions people will park as close as possible without any consideration. If possible, some would park their cars alongside the soccer pitch.</i>
<i>I think it is a great opportunity for the community as a whole to get involved with local women's football as a sport in the lead-up to the women's world cup being held in Australia.</i>
<i>I think anything that encourages the use of facilities and gives people access to a healthy, safe environment should be shared and encouraged, when and wherever possible.</i>
<i>Both children and adults should be encouraged to participate in sporting activities as it benefits their mental, physical and social health. Shire councils should be encouraged to provide a wide range of sporting facilities wherever and whenever needed.</i>
<i>Nice for juniors and senior females to have a good surface to play on; one that is not overused.</i>
<i>Providing rules are adhered to. Common courtesy. All waste is removed and taken home with them or placed in appropriate bins. Parking. I think we should all encourage and motivate people to move outdoors in the community. Use the green locations. How beautiful and how lucky are we!</i>
<i>More community sport and use of the park the better.</i>
<i>It has not impacted on quality of life so far. My only concern would be if the use was expanded to accommodate more clubs / grades resulting in 7 days a week / night use.</i>
<i>Oval to be utilised to its fullest is a wonderful idea. More shade would be great too.</i>
<i>Maybe the trials should be extended to all senior sports, regardless of people's gender that they associate with?</i>
<i>Seniors stay healthier and live longer if they do exercise. Outdoors is better than indoors. I do 90 minutes exercise daily, in the ECU gym, at the beach and doing garden work. Nothing better.</i>
<i>It's great for WPFC Rogers Cup team to have a consistent training ground.</i>
<i>Allowing community sport in a public space seems logical and reasonable to me.</i>
<i>It's great to see our parks being used regularly.</i>
<i>With the limited facilities available to all sporting clubs, it is important to expand the use of any existing facilities to alleviate overall congestion on any grounds. The community should be supporting this to encourage a healthy lifestyle for all. Senior teams have been using various facilities all over Joondalup and any incidents would be few and far between. Clubs have a code of conduct that they have to adhere to so they can be affiliated with the sporting bodies and to continue getting use from the City of Joondalup. Senior teams would be just as much a risk as junior teams and I have personally witnessed more incidents in junior sports.</i>

1. This would just result in more congestion resulting in unsafe passage along Burns Beach Road on practice and game days as there is not enough parking already. Also, what would the impact of these sports be on the turf and what would the increased maintenance costs associated with these impacts be passed on to the ratepayer?

2. Also doubt that the existing facility can cope with a significant increase in the number of people utilising it so are there plans to increase the size of the facility and, if so, what will they be, as they will no doubt impact on ratepayers.

3. What sports specifically are being trialled? If it is AFL only then surely there are enough grounds suitable to host this type of sport in the surrounding areas of Kingsley and not in Burns Beach.

Do you have any comments about the proposed shared use agreement? (N = 73)
<i>Why not use the facilities during the day. It will be great to see it being used.</i>
<i>The park should be used by all and, as the school is next to it, then put it to good use.</i>
<i>If we can encourage being outdoors for primary school children, I'm all for it.</i>
<i>It would be a perfectly sensible use of the facility.</i>
<i>This makes great sense. The school needs the space, and it is not used for the main part of the week. With extra use, with children and senior women coming into close contact with the grass, I think that it is essential that the area be made dog-free. No one cleans up the urine and the clean-up of poo still leave traces on the grass; possible sources of infection if players have cuts or scratches.</i>
<i>I assumed that this would be the case when the area was earmarked for a school anyway.</i>
<i>I can see a clash between dog walkers and school kids using the space. Clearly, they shouldn't co-habitat. Recognising that school use will be limited to recess and lunch breaks. Would need to be clearly signed so everyone is aware of usage patterns. In line with this, Burns Beach Primary School should be praised for allowing access to their basketball courts for casual use. It's fantastic to see the community utilising this facility out of school hours. Again, collaboration to promote activity has multiple benefits.</i>
<i>Because of land use and upkeep of parks / sporting grounds it makes sense to pool resources. (as many places around the world have already done).</i>
<i>Again, it's better to be used than sit idle. Besides the kids will love the open space.</i>
<i>They already use it most days and usually use half of the park closest to the school. If they have shared access, they can dictate who walks or exercises in the park — it's supposed to be a community park for the use of the community around it, not a money-making exercise. They already leave sporting equipment, food waste and rubbish everywhere along with the other clubs, enough is enough.</i>
<i>Access and ability to use our own community park will be further reduced and restricted. We are already unable to use the park at weekends and most evenings due to football this will now mean we can only access the park to walk dogs, exercise and enjoy between the hours of 9.00 pm and 8.00 am — hardly reasonable! The school are already utilising half of the park most days which is already creating limitations.</i>
<i>I don't like the idea of having strangers near children.</i>
<i>Will the school have to pay fees, like it's being proposed to the community clubs from 2023? Who will do the line marking for the field arrangements, and will this line marking conflict the community clubs who also use this field? Will there be extra maintenance of the field. Last season, there were several instances of large ant nests and ants biting the children. The field during winter, takes constant use and by the decision to have the women's AFL over the summer, I believe the field will have heavy wear. This along with the school usage, I question whether the field can be able to maintain an appropriate turf requirement.</i>
<i>The children need this open space to participate in sporting and recreational activities. This is good for their physical, mental and social health. Please place notices in the park to forbid dog walking. Unfortunately, some people do not pick up after their dog and this would leave the children open to standing on dog faeces during their sporting or recreational activities.</i>
<i>Seems to be a practical solution to provide greater recreational space for the school.</i>
<i>Providing CoJ has allocated the additional resources to maintain the condition of the park with the increase in usage.</i>

<i>As long as it doesn't become an exclusive use agreement (ie other people can use the oval at that time as well).</i>
<i>I have no issue with Burns Beach Primary School utilising the oval during school hours. As always, Council won't really take public opinion on these matters. They have and always will do what makes them the most money! As a Burns Beach resident for [- - -] years, I've seen it happen multiple times.</i>
<i>The children certainly need the open space and once again as long as the area is left in a pristine condition after each use, all is well.</i>
<i>No problem with school using the grounds as an oval.</i>
<i>Great use of public space.</i>
<i>It is great to see everyone get the use out of a park and oval and hopefully the primary school will be contributing towards the cost of maintaining the oval.</i>
<i>Given that the vast majority of children attending Burns Beach Primary School are local residents. I strongly support the use of the park by the school as proposed. Outside of school hours it is fully accessible for all residents so the school using the park will not disadvantage other users of the park.</i>
<i>Great idea.</i>
<i>[responded in previous question: If the school is going to use the park from 8.00 am to 4.00 pm I am not sure how it will be shared? Shared with the public or shared between the school and the female senior sport teams? There are a lot of walkers and dog walkers that also enjoy the use the park in the week.] [response in this question: I am not sure how it will be shared if the school has the park from 8.00 am to 4.00 pm. Lots of walkers and dog walkers also enjoy the use of the park in the week.]</i>
<i>I support the school using Bramston Park, but does the school require the whole park? Maybe on special sports days. But generally, when the school is using the park, it is approximately 1/3 of the whole park and the part closest to the school. So many residents regularly walk their dogs there at different times of the day. It is often used as a social gathering for neighbours and friends to meet up whilst exercising their dogs. This social interaction is very important for mental health.</i>
<i>Can we build a skate park in the park? The school's basketball court is attracting many young families to play there after school hours. Would be amazing to extend the facilities to make it a leisure / sports hub for the community</i>
<i>I walk my dog in this park. where else am I to take him? Why are the facilities always for children? What about the elderly with dogs?</i>
<i>In the Burns Beach suburb there are a few grassed parks that have little use other than they look nice. I'm sure there is more that can be done to make these areas more useful to the community of Burns Beach. Suburbs further north have some beautiful parks that encourage visitors. I don't have a problem with parks being used by the school, but I would ask if it is to the exclusion of other people using it during the specified times? Will ratepayers continue to pay for the upkeep of the park? Or will the school pay for that? I think our parks are sadly lacking for attracting nearby residents to get out and use them. The few facilities they have are used. More BBQs.</i>
<i>I think perhaps a special section could be marked-off so older and younger members of the community could still use the park without fear of being interrupted by school sport.</i>
<i>Makes it difficult for us to use the park with our dogs.</i>
<i>Parks are underused during the day and many parks in the area for dogs or parents of young children to use.</i>
<i>Allowing Burns Beach Primary School students to share Bramston Park is a great idea.</i>
<i>I absolutely love hearing and seeing this park being used. My [- - -] attends the primary school and this is definitely an important part of the schooling.</i>
<i>My [- - -] attended the primary school and this would enable the school to have more room for outdoor activities for the children.</i>
<i>The oval should be used to its full potential.</i>

<i>The park facility should be accessible to the school. Nobody gains anything from denying the school to use the facility. However, even during the school hours, if there are no simultaneous school activities, residents must be able to use the facility. On the other hand, the school should continue to allow residents to access the tennis and basketball courts when the school is not using them, as is the current arrangement. A mutual benefit relationship is good for all.</i>
<i>The school should pay a fee to help with the upkeep of the grounds.</i>
<i>Allowing the school to use the park seems logical. The use of public spaces should be maximised so that ratepayers and taxpayers are getting more value for money.</i>
<i>A very important addition to the children's education. I am sure it will not impact community. Kinross Primary has been doing the same for many years and it works well.</i>
<i>Yes, by all means during teaching times, not lunch or recess times. If it were to include lunch and recess breaks, the financial return to the Burns Beach community needs to be sufficient to cover the cost of mowing and fertilising each year. However, it would be prudent of the school to operate in a manner that was consciously aware and proactively allowed for independent individual or small group action on the fringe of the spaces (or in an unused section) during school hours. This would allow residents to walk dogs (picking up after them), partake in exercise or grandchildren-type activities, without interrupting the school program. Again, the school's use of the facility must not be exclusive and will require greater supervision and vigilance on their supervision.</i>
<i>There is no definition of "priority use" in the shared agreement arrangement. While I support the school's use of the park as they currently do, this arrangement must not preclude the use of the park by local residents during the proposed school use hours.</i>
<i>Sports and outdoor activities are a very important part of child development.</i>
<i>I am happy for the school to use half the grounds and it is ok for them to use the entire grounds for carnival days.</i>
<i>Great to see the facilities being used.</i>
<i>Burns Beach Primary School should have full access to that park.</i>

I'm a ratepaying resident who lives in the area and it's clear your planning is not ready for this].</i>
<i>[additional comment in this question: Change the time 9.00 am to 3.00 pm they all leave school before 3.00 pm and don't start until 9.00 am. Use some common sense.]</i>
<i>They decided to build the school knowing there was no space for their own field and now under this proposal they get priority over the space 5 days out of 7. How is that fair for the community!?</i>
<i>Yes, as per my last comment. [previous comment: This was passed many years ago for Juniors only, so try and do what you promised.]</i>
<i>I support this proposal as it makes sense for the school to use this facility. However, I feel that the times should be during school hours only (8.30 am to 3.00 pm). There are many members of the community who run and walk their dogs in this park and have done so for many years prior to the school being built. The proposed hours would make this difficult for those people to continue to enjoy the park early in the morning and afternoon. Students and teachers would be unlikely to use the park before or after school.</i>
<i>This would greatly benefit the health of the children and also there would be minimal impact on the community as the use would occur mainly during school hours. There would also be minimal impact on the facilities at Bramston Park as the kids would just use the school.</i>
